OUR SEPTEMBER MONTHLY SPEAKERS: The Workhouse Storytellers

September At our meeting we were entertained and informed by volunteers, role, from the in Southwell Workhouse. They arrived in costume as four characters from the 1850s: Matron, wife of the Master; Jessie, a cook from a grand house, who had lost her job; John, a 'trusted' pauper, with the job of Porter; and Alice, a vagrant. Two of the stories were based on facts, whilst that of Jessie, was invented but

very much grounded in the lives of people at the time. The story told by John was actually a ghost story but a very moving one about a family, who turned were away from the Workhouse when they arrived too late on a freezing cold evening, only to die before morning. Alice, the vagrant, who spent many years living in a 'bacon box', in Nottingham, had her story reported in the local press. story told The by the Matron, concerned a local horse thief, from Eakring, who eventually emigrated to Canada.



incredibly hard life was at the time, with very little support for those who fell on hard times. It was also emphasised, however, that the elderly, i.e. the 'deserving poor' were cared for fairly well and that children were given an education. In the case of girls this was predominantly domestic tasks!

The four presenters played their parts well and their performances were appreciated. It was hard not to reflect on the current situation with regards to the poor and to wonder just how far attitudes have changed in almost 200 years.





COME DINE WITH US RECIPES

PANANG CURRY

Thai cooking was the theme of our latest meeting of the CDWU group and here is one of the dishes we prepared. By chance, the member who had randomly chosen Thai cuisine turned out to have attended a cooking course in Thailand! An excellent multi-course meal was duly served up, using the original Thai recipes. That said, we did manage to confuse tsp with tbsp when it came to the fish sauce, although I blame the sous-chefs!

Ingredients

300-400g fresh chicken, diced
1 can full-fat coconut milk
3-4 kaffir lime leaves (if no fresh use dried leaves)
1tbsp Panang curry paste (see below)
1 large de-seeded red chilli (large are less hot) finely sliced for decoration
2 tsp palm sugar
2-3 tsp of fish sauce

Method

Boil 3 tbsp of coconut milk in a wok (or large frying pan) over a low heat until oil appears on the surface.

Add curry paste and stir for 1 minute or until fragrant.

Add chicken and cook until it turns white.

Add coconut milk and bring to the boil. Season with palm sugar and fish sauce (and kaffir lime leaves, if using dried)

Let it boil until thickens and chicken cooked through.

Remove from heat add (if using fresh) kaffir leaves and garnish with red chilli to serve.

Serve with boiled rice to your own recipe.

PRIK GANG PED (Red Curry Paste)

This is the basic recipe for a Red Curry paste with the option of adding roasted peanuts to make it into a Panang Curry paste. The paste will keep in the fridge and any leftover paste can also be frozen. If you use the milder large red chillies, it shouldn't be too hot! (Continued overleaf)

COME DINE WITH US RECIPE (Continued)

Ingredients

100g dried large red chilli – soaked and chopped

10g crushed coriander seed

10g shallot

10g garlic

1 stalk fresh lemongrass (not dried! If you cannot get fresh then use lemongrass paste)

10g galangal paste (galangal and lemongrass pastes are available in large supermarkets)

1tbsp turmeric powder (NB likely to stain hands and utensils)

20g lime skin

40g crushed roasted peanuts, if making Panang curry paste

Preparation

Put all ingredients in a food-processor and blend until you have a smooth paste.

Enjoy!
