Pea and Mint Soup – à la Jamie Oliver. (Serves 4)

Pea soup has been around since Roman times, passing through the 'Pease Pudding Hot' of nursery rhyme fame, to the 'pea souper' fogs that strangely disappeared after the passing of the Clean Air Act. By the time you read this, I'll be in Australia where the celebrated 'pie floater' is an Australian-type meat pie, sitting in (or sometimes submerged!) in a bowl of thick pea soup. Yum! Yum!

Ingredients

Frozen or Fresh Peas: 600g – frozen worked very well for us.

Fresh Mint Leaves: A large handful, roughly chopped

Onion: 1 medium, finely chopped.

Garlic: 2 cloves, minced Vegetable Stock: 1 litre

Olive Oil: 2 tbs

Double Cream or Greek Yoghurt: 100ml

Method:

Step 1: Sauté the Onion and Garlic

In a large pot, heat the olive oil over medium heat. Add the chopped onion and cook for 5-7 minutes, stirring occasionally, until softened and translucent. Add the minced garlic and cook for an additional 1-2 minutes until fragrant.

Step 2: Add the Peas and Stock

Stir in the peas and cook for 2-3 minutes to let them soften slightly.

Add the vegetable stock and bring the soup to a simmer. Cook for 5-7 minutes, until the peas are tender.

Step 3: Blend the Soup

Take the pot off the heat and let it cool for a couple of minutes.

Using an immersion (stick) blender, blend the soup until smooth. If using a regular blender, blend in batches, being careful not to overfill the blender.

Step 4: Add the Mint

Add the fresh mint to the blended soup and stir well. Blend again if needed to fully incorporate the mint. Taste the soup and season with salt, pepper, and a squeeze of lemon juice for brightness.

Step 5: Add Cream or Yoghurt

Serve in bowls and swirl in the double cream for a richer, creamier texture. Serve with crusty bread.



Being a group leader and a committee member

Mathematics was always a big part of my life, but after more than forty years in education as a lecturer, teacher and finally a tutor I retired at the age of sixty-nine. Around the same time my post as volunteer treasurer for a Newark counselling service also ceased after 30+ years, due to the company sadly having to close through a lack of funding. My life suddenly had a very big 'hole' in it!

To try to fill this hole I started to volunteer at Southwell Workhouse and Upton Clock Museum, I also took up table tennis again after a fiftyyear gap. However, at the back of my mind I remembered a colleague praising the Southwell u3a and talking about the wide range of opportunities available both socially intellectually. Then I saw the u3a being promoted at Southwell marketplace and was impressed by enthusiasm of its representatives. I joined that day, mainly to become a member of the Astronomy Group.

I was made very welcome there and slowly I learnt more about the principles on which the whole organisation was run. After many years at the helm, the current leader of Astronomy felt that she needed a break and as I needed a fresh challenge in my life, I agreed to take it on.

Being the 'main person' became a tremendous boost for me and I found great enjoyment and stimulation from planning, delivering and leading sessions. The support and encouragement from fellow members was particularly overwhelming.

I was then contacted by Brian who talked possibility about the becoming a committee member and was asked if I would like to attend a meeting without any strings attached. No pressure was put on me, so I thought 'why not?' Other colleagues were of course more knowledgeable than me, but I found that I was treated with respect and that my views were appreciated. Having almost nine hundred members speaks volumes about Southwell u3a and the responsibility to make things work is enormous, but when everything clicks together smoothly, you get a great buzz out of being part of that team. Ever since that first meeting I have no regrets and indeed I feel that I have contributed to that all important word 'progress'.

Communication is a crucial part of our success and I have become a member of the web team, which I feel
