#### Staying Safe Online Workshop Tuesday 5th December 2023

You are invited to attend a workshop to provide help and guidance on an important and yet common experience: Staying Safe Online and avoiding scams. The risk to any one of us falling for a scam, or fraud seems to increase every year so awareness of how this occurs, what's current and what happens next is vital.

On December 5th in Southwell Library ground floor meeting room from 2.00pm – 3.30pm Steve Dickman will give a review of scamming by email, text or telephone, what to do about them, how to report them and most importantly how to avoid them. This will be followed by a practical look at ways of maintaining privacy online, including password management, search engine and browser use, email and social media etc., with an emphasis on cost effective (i.e. free or low cost) solutions.

### **OUR NOVEMBER SPEAKER**



On 7<sup>th</sup> November we invited Paul Lillie to talk to us. He very kindly filled in for our arranged speaker who had to cancel.

Paul talked to us about his life from infant school where he became interested in music and art. He showed some very good examples of his artwork and drawings from a very early age. He then took us through an accompanied talk about music from 1954 and Elvis Presley to 1994 and the punk revolution all accompanied by various songs which all meant something to him growing up.

He talked about the evolution of rock and popular music from blues, country and gospel music, the relationship between them and the influence they had on Elvis, Eddie Cochran and Skiffle in the 50s, through the Beatles, Beach Boys and Mamas and Papas in the 60s, and then through the 70s, 80s and 90s. This was all interspersed with songs which he played and sang to and which the members of u3a sang along to thoroughly enjoying themselves.

He also told the story of Dylan, Pete Seager, Joan Baez and others who wrote songs of rebellion against the Vietnam War, the Civil Rights and Women's Liberation Movement as well as nuclear war and the influences they had.

He also illustrated rock's relationship with the visual arts through the work of artists such as Peter Blake and Andy Warhol.

All in all, it was a thoroughly entertaining morning for us all and many members thanked Paul for his performance.

Remember also that the January meeting is on **Tuesday 9th January** as it was felt that the first Tuesday in January, the 2nd, was too close to New Years Day when many of us will still be recovering!

## <u>'what3words' - what does this</u> <u>mean and how to use it?</u>

'what3words' is a nifty and userfriendly tool that helps you easily find and share precise locations in the UK and around the world. It takes the complexity out of traditional GPS coordinates and replaces them with something incredibly simple: three easy-to-remember words.

Imagine you're planning to meet friends in a vast park or direct a delivery driver to your doorstep. Instead of struggling with postcodes, landmarks, or long strings of numbers, you can use 'what3words'. For instance, "table.lamp.sofa" can guide anyone to your exact location, making it perfect for situations where clear directions matter.

What's particularly handy is that 'what3words' covers the entire UK and beyond. You can use it whether you're in London or exploring the stunning Scottish Highlands. And the best part? It doesn't require an internet connection, so you can rely on it even in areas with poor signal. for everyone, whether you are techsavvy or not. It's available in multiple languages, so you can use it comfortably anywhere you go, and it's accurate to within just a few meters, ensuring you always find your destination with ease.

In a nutshell, 'what3words' is a gamechanger for simplifying location sharing and navigation, making it an essential tool for everyday life in the UK and beyond. Whether it's for social meet-ups, emergencies, or deliveries, it's your reliable guide to finding your way.

Simply type in **what3words** to a search engine and amazingly it will give you a unique sequence of three words for where you are at that moment and indicate your position on a map with an accuracy of around three metres: This system is used by many delivery services and emergency services, so could be really useful.

### Astronomy Group



He went through how to use some of the more obvious manual settings and showed us how to get past the easy option of letting the camera do our thinking for us.

### POTATO & SAUSAGE SOUP (KARTOFLANKA)

Continuing our random exploration of the cuisines of other nations, this month's "<u>Dine with Us</u>" recipe is a hearty winter warmer from Poland. Polish meals often start with a soup but this one can be a meal in itself, particularly with some interesting bread on the side. Our attempt to make 'pierogies' (dumplings) was slightly less successful, as most were a bit too heavy, but one of mine is still coming in handy as a door wedge!

### **INGREDIENTS:**

**Potatoes**: 1 kg (suitable for boiling) peeled and cut into approx.  $\frac{1}{2}$ " cubes **Pork** (smoked): about 6oz/170g eg 10 strips smoked bacon cut into  $\frac{1}{2}$ " pieces **OR** about 6oz Polish sausage/chorizo/bratwurst – cut lengthways & then into  $\frac{1}{2}$ " pieces

Carrots: 2 large - peeled & cubed

Parsnip: 1 medium – peeled & cubed

**Peppercorns**: 6 whole and (optional) 4 allspice berries (or pinch of allspice powder)

Bay leaves: 2 Salt & pepper: about ¼ tsp (to taste) Water: about 700ml Chicken stock: about 700ml

MIREPOIX Onion: 1 medium diced Celery: 1 stalk diced Marjoram: ¼ – ½ tbsp

# COME DINE WITH US RECIPES

### ROUX: Butter: 2 tbsp Flour: 2 tbsp all-purpose flour

#### METHOD:

Sauté bacon (if using) until crisp, remove and reserve half for topping **OR** brown the chopped sausage in a pan and remove and reserve for later.

Into a large pot return half of the bacon **OR** all of the sausage. Add potatoes, carrots, parsnip, peppercorns, allspice berries and bay leaves. After 2–3 mins add water & stock. On medium heat slow boil for 20 minutes, or until veggies are soft. Towards the end add salt & pepper to taste: You may need to be easy on the salt as the meats and stock add salt too.

**Mirepoix:** In a small sauté/frying pan on medium/low heat, melt a little oil or butter (1 tbsp). Add diced onion & celery & cook until translucent (don't burn). Add marjoram for 1 minute. Remove from pan and set aside.

**Roux:** In a small sauté/frying pan on medium heat add the 2tbsp butter and then add the flour and for 2–3 mins stir with a wooden spoon in a figure of 8 pattern until well combined and light in colour. Allow to cool 2 mins. Then add a couple of cups of the hot soup and whisk to combine. Heat until it thickens. Combine **mirepoix** and **roux** in soup pot. Stir until soup thickens. Serve with bacon pieces (if using).
