COURSES AND WORKSHOPS

attended three recently: two ľve tasters of the new On-line lectures -80+ in all - which you can join for £12 a year in addition to your u3a or on its own: it's ideal if you're struggling to get to physical meetings. There has been a week of taster sessions and I tasted Armchair Archaeology and Pop for Third Agers both extremely interesting and informative in very different ways. But the best 'lecture' I have heard for a long time has been Carl Honoré's How to Age Better (it was recorded and can be found on the national website). He suggested society was drenched in ageism which affects all on spectrum but weighs more heavily on those at the higher end. We call out racism and sexism so why not ageism? If we worship youth and denigrate age we are going to age less well; we may even shave off seven and a half years of life! Ageism narrows our horizons.

So, he suggests we should ditch all the expressions and stereotypes, redefine upwards, our attitudes to No more 'senior' moments: ageing. think of them as goldfish moments! Learning is not just for the young: you can teach old dogs new tricks - it's even true of dogs! We are entering a golden age of ageing: there are more of us on the planet than ever before; chronological age is losing its power to define and limit us. OUR OCTOBER SPEAKER: Russia: Beauty or Beast?



On 3rd October we had a return visit expert Dr Russian Cathy Post-Doctoral Research McAteer. Fellow at University Exeter specialising in Russian culture. This time her talk Russia: Beauty or Beast gave us an insight into what has been going on in Russia since the break-up of the Soviet Union and some background to what happening now in Ukraine and within Russia and other former USSR countries. We had hoped of course that the war would be over or coming near to a conclusion by now

but it seems to be heading for more years of savage attritional conflict backed by many people across Russia, people who thank Putin for bringing stability and economic growth, particularly after the collapse of the rouble in 1998 which wiped out savings and pensions and resulted in widespread poverty misery. Cathy's talk was, like her earlier talk, lively, informative and passionate and above all very knowledgeable about the country, its people and culture. No wonder then that she is in great demand as a speaker and those of our members who were not at the meeting missed a memorable talk, one of the best in the ten years that I have been booking speakers.

OUR NEXT SPEAKER (7th Nov)

Next month we have booked Paul Lillie who will talk about the evolution of rock and popular music from Blues, Gospel, Folk and Country and pop music's capacity for protest and rebellion against key political events such as the Vietnam war. He will also examine the cultural impact of writers such as Dylan and The Beatles and illustrate rock's relationship with the visual arts through the work of artists such as Peter Blake and Andy Warhol. Paul's entertaining and informative talk will be interspersed with many songs and anecdotes from his own career which has included impersonating and illustrating many of his musical idols.

If you have any u3a electrical equipment on long-term loan and you've not already had it PAT-tested for electrical safety, now is your last chance this year to do so! Our PAT tester, Verdun, will be at our next monthly meeting in the Leisure Centre on 7th November. You (or a member of your group) should bring along any equipment that still requires testing and Verdun will collect all such items during the break or at the end of the meeting. He will then take them away for testing and will contact you as soon as he has done so.

Please note that it is usually only the power cable that needs to be tested. The electrical item itself does not normally need testing, unless it has 2 concentric squares close to the serial number details. If in doubt, bring along both the lead and electrical item and Verdun will let you know what needs to be done.


Astronomy Group



Proposed New Group for all music lovers: "Music through the decades"

My name is Philip . I have been a member of Aylesbury Vale u3a for a number of years and have enjoyed running a successful music group based around music from our younger days. My wife and I recently moved to Southwell and I would like to start a similar group here, "Sounds from The Decades" (from 1930s to 1970s).

PISTO CON HUEVOS - Serves 2 (photo shows quantity for 4)

"Ah, Pisto!" – as the old gravy advert almost used to go. Pisto is originally from the La Mancha region of Spain and it's really the Spanish equivalent of the French dish, ratatouille. It's a recipe that's suitable for vegans/vegetarians but I guess you could throw in a few chunks of cooking chorizo at the stage of adding the herbs, if you absolutely can't do without some meat in your meals!

Ingredients

1 tbsp olive oil
1 onion, finely chopped
2 garlic cloves, finely chopped
2 different coloured peppers, chopped into chunks
1 tsp dried oregano
Leaves from a few thyme sprigs
2 bay leaves
1 courgette, chopped into chunks
½ aubergine, chopped into chunks
2 large tomatoes, roughly chopped
2 large eggs
Smoked paprika to taste
½ small pack parsley, leaves roughly chopped



Method

Heat the oil in a large flameproof casserole dish or a cast-iron skillet over a low heat. Add the onions and a sprinkle of salt, cover and cook gently for 15 mins, stirring occasionally. Add the garlic and cook for another 2 mins.

Next, throw in the peppers and cook over a medium heat, covered, for about 5 mins, stirring every so often, until the peppers are just tender.

Mix in the oregano, thyme, bay leaves, a little smoked paprika and some black pepper and a little salt, if needed. Tip in the courgette and aubergine, combine thoroughly, and cook over a medium heat, covered, for 10 mins. Stir in the tomatoes, cover and cook for 20 mins, stirring occasionally.

Carefully crack the eggs into the pisto – try not to break the yolks. Making two shallow wells in the pisto helps. Cook in the sauce on a medium heat for 5-6 mins until the eggs are cooked through but still a little soft, then scatter with parsley before serving.

Serve with country-style bread and fruity red wine - Enjoy!
