This vibrant group visits art galleries and museums to see permanent collections, temporary exhibitions, displays and similar events.




Theatre group

Ashfield u3a member Jackie Brown did a skydive on Saturday 10th September and has raised a considerable amount of money for Ukraine. She spoke at our September meeting about her experience and we were treated to a short video of the event. I must say she did look very relieved when she was back on terra firma. Well done Jackie.



Our Friendly Gardeners have been out and about again, visiting Felley Priory Gardens in September and were very impressed with the variety and rarity of the many plants there. They also enjoyed their lunch and made some purchases from the nursery. A return visit, at a different time of the year, is very likely to be planned.

Ashfield u3a's new Litter Picking Group has now been issued with appropriate equipment and is all set to hit the ground and clean up Ashfield area. Best wishes to this new group. I am sure that they will bond together, make friends and do a good job of cleaning up where it is needed.

The Family & Social History Group met in September and the subject of the meeting was Household items. This proved to be an excellent topic. Members brought items as diverse as an Anglo Indian Sewing Box, Washing Dolly, Childs Spoon and Pusher, Salter scales, can/tin opener and a Cat's Whisker crystal radio and talked about their objects. As a topical subject they also learned about the history of No 10's door. They report that they had a wonderful afternoon and everybody really enjoyed it.

Our Miscellany Group visited Sherwood Observatory in October, which is situated at one of the highest points in the County. They enjoyed a presentation which compared the Hubble telescope launched in December 1990, and the James Webb telescope launched in December 2021. The Webb's sensitive wavelengths allow it to peer inside dust clouds where stars are forming and look further back in time to see the first stars and galaxies that formed in the early Universe. The group were also excited to learn about plans for development of the site into a 'state of the art' tourist attraction, subject to final planning consent.

In October some of our members ventured to Limone on Lake Garda, Northern Italy, and had a wonderful holiday exploring the area by bus, cable car and boat. The weather was warm and sunny and they are copious amounts of delicious Gelato during the holiday. Some of them learnt Canasta in the evenings too.

A full coach loaded with members visited the Pottery and Art Museum at Stoke on Trent in October. This proved to be a surprise because, in addition to the interesting and extensive collection of pottery items, they found that it was home to the Staffordshire Hoard and a Spitfire. They then went on to visit a National Trust property at Congleton. Little Moreton Hall is described as being a Tudor Fantasy. Its walls and floors are crooked and uneven and can leave you feeling slightly dizzy at times. They were fortunate to enjoy lunch out in the garden in the sunshine and it was a superb day out.

The Strollers Group walked at Annesley and Newstead Country Park. This park stretches over 220 acres and is situated on the site of the former colliery pit tips. The park has amazing wildlife and was designated as a 'site of importance' in 2016.

Its activities include visits, information on public talks, lectures and demonstrations at the universities. It is one of our most popular groups, now boasting over 100 members.

Around 30 members of the group attended a fascinating presentation on robots and artificial intelligence at Nottingham University's Jubilee campus, where they learnt that robots have gone from science fiction to everyday fact and have enormous potential to enhance human experience. There are currently around three million industrial robots that have transformed quality and productivity in the workplace. They are also used in surgery, transport and areas dangerous or difficult for humans to enter, such as nuclear facilities, as well as being increasingly used to enhance the lives of those with disabilities - aiding speech and movement and en-

hancing independence.


Costa del Sol, Spain

Around are a number of very pretty typically Spanish white villages: Nerja, Frigiliana and Torrox itself. We were lucky to be there when the annual







KEYWORTH AND RUDDINGTON U3A HISTORY OF CONFLICT GROUP

This group has evolved from the long running World War 1 study group that for over 10 years took that conflict as its subject and extensively studied all aspects of that terrible war.

With the passing of the centenary celebrations it was decided to widen our studies and thus 'rebranded' ourselves as 'The History Of Conflict'.

Our aim is to provide a broader background than previously to highlight how armed conflict has developed over the years and the huge impact it has had on politics and society.

As such we have no cut off points in time and scope. Anything from a caveman's club to the Ukrainian war in 2022 are fair game. We also do not restrict ourselves to the 'hardware' of warfare but devote considerable time and effort to ALL effects, political economic, geographical and societal.

The Group Leader, currently Tony Broadbent (07860 598996), selects a series of topics based on members interest and publishes a timetable running several months ahead. This core of subjects encourages members to do their own research to compliment that month's topics. A film and/or presentation will be run, discussed and complimented by members from the floor.

Presentations have covered a wide range of topics including:

Bomber Command in WW2

South Africa:- Two centuries of turmoil

The German revolution of 1919

America re-arms- USA race to rearm prior to WW2

The Japanese-Russian conflict of 1905

The Italy-Greek war of 1912


Guests turned up in wartime attire with a prize awarded to the best outfit. Refreshments with delicious buns and biscuits were served up by our lovely helpers at half-time.

Five go on a Photo Shoot



The route was carefully chosen for accessibility, to provide opportunities for members to study a selection of subjects and, more particularly the autumn colour. A group of five of us emerged into the welcome autumn sunshine: three regulars, one re-joined member and a new member - a guest from Rotherham u3a. Whilst not everyone could make it on the day, other members went down to the same spot and we shared the photos at our next regular indoor meeting.
